NEW COURSES:

To the <u>Courses of Instruction</u> section (pg. 55), the following courses were added:

LATIN (LAT)

LAT 2020: Intermediate Latin II (3)

Additional grammar and vocabulary are the focus of this continuation of LAT 1020 (or its equivalent). Students begin reading unaltered Latin literature from classical and ecclesial sources. (06/13/2024)

LAT 2040: The Rule of St. Benedict-Latin Readings (3)

Students will read the Rule of St. Benedict in Latin. They will be asked to translate into English and to compose reflections on the text in Latin. We will also read excerpts from the Code of Canon Law in Latin. Students will be asked to compose reflections in Latin on how Canon Law and The Rules of St. Benedict Compliment one another. Prerequisites: Grade of at least C- in both LAT1010 & LAT1020, or equivalent. (06/13/2024)

LAT 2050: The Life of St. Benedict-Latin Readings (3)

Students will read The Life of St. Benedict in Latin. They will be asked to translate into English and to compose reflections of the text in Latin.

SOCIAL & BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES (SBS)

SBS 2010: Human Flourishing: A Catholic-Christian Model of Psychology and the Human Person (3)

When appropriately integrated with faith, psychology can aid human flourishing by understanding and addressing human problems. This course works to develop a Catholic-Christian vision of human flourishing by articulating a vision of personhood through the wisdom of psychological science and the wisdom traditions of Catholic philosophy and theology. The course will also examine the best psychological theory, evidence, and interventions supporting a vision of human flourishing for a life of virtue, committed vocations, and addressing human problems that prevent flourishing. THEOLOGY ELECTIVES & SEMINARS

THL 2600: Readings in Theological Anthropology (2)

The course Readings in Theological Anthropology is a two-hour survey course. It is a

doctrinal survey with respect to the life of grace, especially sanctifying grace and the indwelling of the Holy Spirt, and the human person in the Catholic Tradition. The course is designed to give an overview of some of the key concepts in the Catholic tradition that constitute the Catholic Tradition and teaching on grace, sin and the human person as well as a survey of the long and rich history of theological reflection on this vast subject. It will examine representative texts from biblical sources, (especially Paul), patristic sources Thomas Aquinas, Luther, and the Council of Trent and the anthropology of the Second Vatican Council as represented in *Gaudium et spes*, Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World. HISTORY (HIS)

A historical survey of the origins of human civilization that developed into that is known as Western Europe and its cultural influence from approximately the year 25,000 B.C. to A.D. 1492. Particular epochs will include things such as Mesopotamian culture, Greek City-states, the Roman Empire, the rise and spread of Christianity and Islam, the Carolingian period, the Byzantine Empire, Scholasticism, the Crusades, and the Black Death. The purpose of the course if to familiarize the student with the main features of Wester Civilization, its religious, artistic, economic, and philosophical ideas that influence society today. Students will be encouraged to synthesize and critically analyze these ideas and the historiography of the canon as presented. There will be a particular focus on Art History, with focused case studies presented weekly. (06/13/2024)

A historical survey of Western Europe and its cultural influence from approximately the year 1500 to the present. The purpose of the course is to familiarize the student with the main features of Western Civilization, its religious, artistic, economic, and philosophical ideas that influence society today. Students will be encouraged to synthesize and critically analyze these ideas and the historiography of the canon as presented. There will be a particular focus on Art History, with focused case studies presented weekly. (06/13/2024)
